**— Award for Excellence in Cultural Resource Management—
(2018)**

Current Committee Charge: The committee solicits nominations and selects recipients for the Award for Excellence in Cultural Resource Management, which recognizes an individual or a group for their lifetime contributions and special achievements in the categories of program administration/management, site preservation, and research in cultural resource management. The award is presented in special recognition of excellence by an archaeologist or group of archaeologists, working in a cultural resource management setting, whose innovative research, or repeated and enduring contributions, have contributed significantly to archaeology. The award cycles among three categories: program administration/management, site preservation, and research in cultural resource management.

Committee Composition: Committee composition is chair and at least four members.

Term Length: Term length is three years. Individuals ending their terms cycle off the committee at the close of the Business Meeting held during the annual SAA Meeting, and new appointees begin their terms at this time.

Award Cycle: The award cycles through three categories (preservation [2018], research [2019], and program administration/management [2020]... and the cycle continues).

Award Description: This award will be presented to an individual or a group to recognize lifetime contributions and special achievements in the categories of program administration/management, site preservation, and research in cultural resource management. It is intended that at least one award will be made each year and the category will rotate annually. The 2018 Award for Excellence in Cultural Resource Management will be presented in the PRESERVATION category. Candidates may include individuals employed by federal, state, tribal, or local government agencies, museums, educational institutions, and similar institutions who have developed and or implemented public policy, regulations, and ordinances that further cultural resource site protection and historic preservation on a local or regional basis.

Who Is Eligible to Submit Nominations or Apply for the Award: Any professional archaeologist may submit a nomination for this award. Awardees may be members or nonmembers of the SAA.

Nomination/Submission Materials Required: Nominators must submit a curriculum vita along with any relevant supporting documents. All nomination materials are to be submitted electronically See the nomination form at <http://www.saa.org/AbouttheSociety/Awards/tabid/123/Default.aspx>.

Nomination/Submission Materials Required: A detailed description of the nominee's accomplishments with respect to furthering preservation. Preservation can include to specific projects, program development, public involvement, and/or policy development, among others.

Nomination/Submission Deadline: December 31, 2017

Other Special Requirements: None.

Selection or Evaluation Criteria: Nominations will be evaluated based on lifetime contributions and special achievements, including contributions to the field of archaeology and cultural resource management.

Committee Deliberation Process (e.g. dates, venue): The committee meets electronically after the nomination deadline has passed.

Nature of Award (e.g. monetary, medal, symposium): The awardee is recognized by the SAA through a plaque presented during the business meeting held at the Annual Meeting, a citation in *The SAA Archaeological Record*, and acknowledgment on the awards page of the SAA Website.

Awardees

2017 Jeffery Franz Burton

Jeffrey Franz Burton is the 2017 recipient of the SAA's Excellence in Cultural Resource Management Award for his administrative and management skills as well as for his promotion of socially relevant aims for our profession. Mr. Burton's work on the incarceration of Japanese-Americans during World War II illustrates how archaeology can be employed to illuminate racism in the treatment of immigrants. As a manager and administrator he was able to mobilize limited funds and resources efficiently and effectively to underscore the mission of the National Park Service. In his public outreach program he was able to show future generations that the charge of archaeology can be directed for socially relevant work in the interests of the public good.

2016 Dr. Tom Emerson

Tom Emerson is the 2016 recipient of the SAA's Excellence in Cultural Resource Management Award for his exemplary achievements in research under the CRM banner. Dr. Emerson's contributions to Midwestern archaeology and especially to our understanding of the prehistory of the Midcontinent stand as models for merging research with the greater goals of preservation and public outreach. Tom's career milestones have included extended service as Chief Archaeologist of the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency and the phenomenal success of the University of Illinois based Contract Archaeology program, which he has shepherded for over 20 years. In addition to pioneering and refining our understanding of the seminal Cahokia site complex, Dr. Emerson's intellectual contributions have extended to historic archaeology and to the critical Euroamerican contact period. Tom's long and distinguished career has recently been highlighted as he became the 2014 recipient of Career Achievement awards from both the Midwest Archaeological Conference and the Illinois Archaeological Survey.

2014 Mark Michel

Mark Michel's life's work and accomplishments exemplify the contributions and special achievements that the SAA strives to recognize with the Award for Excellence in Cultural Resource Management. There are few individuals whose lives and careers have had such a broad and profound impact on archaeology at the national scale. Mark Michel's efforts over the last 35 years in advocating for, and effecting, cultural heritage stewardship, conservation archaeology, policy and legislative implementation, and public outreach are unsurpassed and have forever changed the face of US archaeology. Under Michel's pioneering leadership, The Archaeological Conservancy remains the only national nonprofit organization dedicated to the permanent protection and management –through site acquisition from private landowners–of America's endangered archaeological sites. In creating a national system of archaeological preserves for

future generations to study and enjoy, Michel has helped to ensure the survival of our irreplaceable cultural heritage –a lasting legacy for all.

2013 Henry Wallace

Henry D. Wallace has earned the SAA Award for Excellence in Cultural Resources Management for his exceptional and pivotal research on the Hohokam of southern Arizona. His 32 years of research from directing numerous survey and excavation projects has resulted in a regional perspective and refinement of temporal and dynamic changes in Hohokam settlement patterns over time. Some highlights of his research include building a chronology of rock art styles; ceramic research that has allowed the refinement of chronological intervals to a generational scale in the Hohokam region; and understanding how village formation and community structure change through time and across large regional scales. His research in CRM has enabled a broad and insightful view and understanding of the Hohokam world, their social organization, settlement structure, patterns of political leadership, and ritual influence, deriving from research that goes far beyond a simple view of the archaeological record.
